



Mary Margaret "Peggy" Antrim returned to her heavenly home June 16, 2018 at the age of 73 after a long illness. She was born in Lafayette, Indiana November 15, 1944 to Harold Forbes Antrim and Mary Elizabeth Antrim. Once her dad graduated from Purdue University, her family traveled the world while her father proudly served 30 years in the US Army. One of her favorite adventures was in Thailand where she acquired a love of diverse cultures and foods. Her family was stationed in Arkansas from 1961-1965 during her high school years. She obtained her Bachelor's Degree from Arkansas Tech and then taught in Miami Central High School and was particularly instrumental in calming racial tensions among the students at the time. Her love for her students propelled her to pursue a master's program at Texas Tech University. When her studies were completed, Peggy came to San Antonio, Texas where she worked as a physical education teacher at Woodridge Elementary school for 30 years. She was so inspiring to both the students and instructors there. She had the students "walk around the world" one continent at a time. She determined the mileage from coast to coast and then each day as they walked they marked off the mileage on a big chart until they reached the goal. Then off to the next continent. She held "Olympic" events every 4 years, compete with opening and closing ceremonies. Routinely she developed creative obstacle courses and competitions to learn new skills. She always kept her classes fun as well as educational. She was a creative genius.

Peggy was multitalented and always stretching her horizons. She was a great outdoorsman. She loved camping and was a camp counselor for many years. Anyone who had the opportunity to camp with Peggy came away knowing survivor skills they never imagined. She was the original Bear Grills, minus

eating the nasty bugs. She loved to travel and took many road trips with friends. One summer while on break from school she and her friend Judy, decided to go on a sightseeing trip halfway across America, with very little money in an old VW bus. They slept out under the stars, met lots of interesting people, ran out of funds a few times, caught up with friends when they could and created lots of great memories to share. She enjoyed fishing, canoeing and many other sports like golfing and basketball. On her answering machine she greeted each caller with "Go Spurs Go." She hated it anytime the Spurs could not pull out a win.

Peggy grew up in a devoted Christian family with strong moral values. She was so proud of her mother's dedication to service in the church community all her life. She and her siblings followed their mom's example. Peggy loved her family. She always was traveling to be with family during special occasions and cherished her time together with them. She especially looked forward to Christmas in Florida and grilled seafood or Thanksgiving in Odessa and the amazing spread complete with her mom's oyster dressing. She loved her nieces and nephews and great nieces and nephews as much as if they were her own children and bragged constantly about their accomplishments. Peggy became an avid genealogist. She enjoyed opportunities to have contact with extended family members to gather information even taking trips for the express purpose of collecting family documents and information to build the family tree. One of her favorite claims to fame was The Jessop and Antrim Ice Cream Co. in Indianapolis. Indiana back in the 1930's started by the Antrim brothers. She was very proud of this heritage and had a special place in her heart for the delectable frozen treat. Peggy was an accomplished photographer and anywhere she went she had a camera in her hand. Her family history and photographs are a legacy that will span generations. She didn't keep her talents to herself, but was documenting family celebrations, church events and personal stories through picture and videotaping sessions for hundreds of families at no cost to them. Her love for her Savior Jesus Christ highlighted her life and legacy. She proclaimed the Good News wherever she went, no matter if her conversation was with a person in line at the grocery store or a lifelong friend, everyone knew without a doubt, Peggy loved the Lord and wanted others to know of Him and His glorious plan of happiness. She also kept meticulous journals and notes as she studied God's word and recounted His tender mercies in her life. Peggy wore herself out in service to God and her fellowmen. One way to describe the true love of God is to serve others in distress even when you are undergoing your own personal pain. Peggy always put others welfare over her own. As she neared the completion of her journey on earth she spent all the energy she could muster checking on her ill friends.
